The Importance of Relationship in Evangelism

38% of Christians do not have a single non-Christian friend or family member. *Almost half of millennials say they experience a general sense of emptiness. A similar percentage say they often feel rejected.*

62% of lapsed and non-Christians say that someone who listens without judgement would be the best person to talk with about faith.

1/3 of lapsed and non-Christians say some of the Christians they know listen without judgement.

1/4 of lapsed and non-Christians say some of the Christians they know allow them to come to their own conclusions.

17% of Christians demonstrate an interest in other people's stories or listen to them. 1 in 5 Christians personally take the time to know the story of the person they're sharing their faith with.

Jesus was asked more than 370 questions in the gospels...yet Jesus only answered 8 of them directly...but he did ask 182 questions in return. (You don't need to have all the answers!)

As we seek to share the good news of Jesus, we would do well to listen to the stories of the people around us.

No one will care how much we know until they know how much we care!

From the desk of Dr. Shirley....

Good morning! God is good all the time. All the time, God is good! It is a beautiful day to praise the Lord here in Yuma, Arizona.

Several people have asked me to publish again my reasons for requesting no applause after a choir offering. You will remember that we have no performances during a service here at Gloria de Cristo—only presentations of worship. Therefore, when the choir sings, the Bells of Glory ring, a small ensemble, or a soloist sings, these are presentations of worship to God. The focus is on God, and you are invited to participate in that attitude of worship.

If the presentation to God also especially blesses your heart, please offer TO GOD a hearty “Amen” which means “so be it” and maintains the attitude of worship. If, on the other hand, someone applauds, the focus goes immediately from worshipping God to adulation of the performer and robs God of His glory. If I am the person making the offering, it also robs me of my blessing in serving God and ministering to His people.

We clap at ballgames because we want to encourage the players. We clap at concerts because we enjoyed the music we heard. We do not clap at church after the reading of God’s word because our focus is on worshipping Him and hearing from Him. We do not applaud the Pastor for bringing us a wonderful sermon or teaching because we are still trying to internalize what God was telling us during that time, although some of the braver of us will say “Amen” if we agree with what was said.

Just so, saying “Amen” after a musical offering is an appropriate way to say that we agree, and our hearts are blessed. This keeps the focus on our Holy Lord God. We do this while we are walking with Jesus to bring new life and hope to every person.

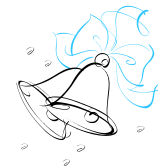
